

A Pioneer Speaks

Our first high school was short lived. It burned about a year and a half after its construction – on New Year's night while a New Year's party was going on in the new Community Church on Los Angeles Avenue.

A boy named Bill Townsend left the party early, only to return and tell the party that the new school was on fire. Many would not believe him, but Mr. Pollock, then a teacher in the school, followed him out and affirmed his report. The fire started in the auditorium and because it was a one story building and there was a lot of help from the church party, much of the class room furniture was thrown out of the building and thus saved. Our son Arthur, then in the church party, helped throw some of the furniture out of the windows.

The trustees of the new school were Wayne Montgomery, F.J. Fitzgerald, I.V. Brown and Walter Osborne. The teachers were Caroline Brinkmeyer, English and history, V.E. Hebel, Spanish and Boys Athletics, Sarah Stoneman, vice principal, science and chemistry and a Mr. Simonds, music.

The principal was D.W. Adamson, who also taught commercial subjects and civics. There were only two graduates that first year, Margaret Silva and Margaret Cannell. I have written to both of these girls, but so far have only heard from Margaret Silva. She is now Mrs. Klee and has three very smart boys.

She has spent most of her life in Sacramento working for the Department of Motor Vehicles. As soon as I hear from Margaret Cannell, I will let it be known in some future letter. The first high school was insured for \$53,000 and by adding about \$23,000 the new and larger two story building was built to replace it. This two story building is still in use, and is known as the Center Junior High School. In a later letter we will picture this school and tell more about it.

One reason that we know so much about our schools is because we had four children, all attended our local schools and turned out well.

At the first graduation of the two girls mentioned above, Dr. Lee gave the invocation and Dr. Rogers the address.

The Community Methodist Church, gave the high school room in the unfinished church, after the first high school building was destroyed by fire. Most of the rough frame work was up and by tacking building paper on the rough two by four frame, class rooms were created. PAGE 4 THE MAIL CART
